this flank). At about 4.30pm the Commanding officer directed that a retirement should be carried out to the line of the CHHEMIN DES DAME. D Coy, fell back first, in well extended formation, followed by A & B Coys with C Company bringing up the rear. Captain LONGBOURNE commanded the latter Company and brought in several of our wounded officers and men. The Battn, lay about 50yds in front of our own Artillery and under heavy shell fire from the enemy until darkness came on.

The following were the casualties amongst the officers and men of the Battn:-

PAISSY RIDGE

- <u>15<sup>th</sup> September 1914</u> 2 Companies entrenched all night on the line of the CHEMIN DES DAME road and 2 Companies remained in support in a hollow about 600 yds in rear. Shelled soon after dawn. Enemy attacked at 1.00pm but were repulsed. C & D Companies relieved by A & B at 6.15pm. Casualties 1 K and 1 wounded.
- <u>16<sup>th</sup> September 1914</u> A & B relieved at 8.30am by C & D Companies. Intermittent firing from snipers all-day and shelled from 4.30-6.30pm. Trenches improved by hollowing out under parapet for protection against shell fire. Casualties 2 K & 4 wounded.
- 17th September 1914A & B Coys relieved C & D at dawn. Shelling very bad today. At<br/>1130am the French on our right retired and left our Artillery exposed.<br/>The two Coys in support came up and filled up the gap, sustaining<br/>severe casualties in doing so. This line was held until 7.15pm when<br/>the French reoccupied it assisted by our own Companies who<br/>occupied another 50 yds of frontage.<br/>Casualties:-<br/>Lt-Colonel D. WARREN killed<br/>Captain C.E. WILSON killed<br/>Lieutenant R.S. PRINGLE died of wounds in hospital.<br/>Lieutenant IREMONGER wounded<br/>Captain C.F. Watson D.S.O. rejoined the Battn this evening and<br/>assumed command. N.C.O's and men 6 killed and 48 wounded.

The Commanding Officer and Captain Wilson were buried in PAISSY Church Yard.

- <u>18<sup>th</sup> September 1914</u> C & D relieved A & B Coys before dawn. Trenches further improved. Shelled 6am till 3.15pm without a respite. Casualties not heavy except for one platoon where the trenches had not been deepened through lack of time. Casualties:-2 Lieut E.D. Drew wounded .N.C.O's and men 6 killed 48 wounded and 16 missing.
- <u>19<sup>th</sup> September 1914</u> Enemy attacked at 1am in a blinding rain storm but were repulsed. Relieved by COLDSTREAM GUARDS at 3am and Battn marched to VENDRESSE where we went into bivouac. We now rejoined our own Bde, and were acting as support to the WELCH REGT. Casualties- Nil.
- 20<sup>th</sup> September 1914 VENDRESSE.

Reinforced the 18<sup>th</sup> Bde with 2 Companies at 2pm. But remained in Support as the SHERWOOD FORESTERS had recaptured the trenches vacated by the WEST YORKSHIRE REGT,. A & B Coys relieved C & D at 10.15pm. Lieut NOSE TROUPE and Lieut FOUND joined with 197 N.C.O's and men (3<sup>rd</sup> Reinforcement). Casualties- Nil.

- <u>21<sup>st</sup> September 1914</u> A&B Coys relieved C & D at 6.30am and latter remained all day in reserve to the 18<sup>th</sup> Bde. Major E.C.PILLEAU D.S.O. died of wounds in hospital at NEUILLY.
- <u>22<sup>nd</sup> September 1914</u> A & B Coys relieved C & D at 6.30 am. Alarm at 1pm & whole Battn reinforced 18<sup>th</sup> Bde and remained in reserve. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Bde replaced 18<sup>th</sup> Bde in their trenches at 6pm. Our own Arty, shelled short and caused 5 casualties. Total casualties today 1 K and 9 wounded
- <u>23<sup>rd</sup> September 1914</u> Quiet day except for snipers. Lieut BURTON joined Battn. Casualties 5 wounded.
- <u>24<sup>th</sup> September 1914</u> <u>NR. VENDRESSE</u> Quiet day except for snipers. Casualties 1 K and 2 wounded.
- <u>25<sup>th</sup> September 1914</u> C Coy shelled by our own Arty, being short. Casualties 2 killed and 5 wounded.
- <u>26<sup>th</sup> September 1914</u> The enemy commenced an attack at 4am before it was light, and marched in fours across our front at 200 yds range. The right of D Coy and left of C Coy opened fire with also one machine gun and inflicted heavy losses. Our Arty again short today and were responsible for nearly all casualties which were:-Lieut H.J.P. Thompson wounded 3 N.C.O's and men killed and 20 wounded.

On this day there were over 50 dead counted in front of our trenches
